Hello Grand Avenue Family and Friends,

We now enter March and the Christian Season of Lent. Lent, of course, is the 40 days leading up to Easter. This important Christian Season is a time for repentance, reflection, and spiritual rededication to the principles of our faith in light of Jesus' sacrificial death for our salvation. As we embark on this Lenten season it's important to understand that we are carrying on an ancient Christian observance.

Historians generally agree that the formal formation of Lent as a 40-day season emerged shortly after the first ecumenical Council of Nicea in 325 AD. However, we know from the ancient writings of the Patristic Fathers (leaders of the early church) that a period of fasting and self-denial leading up to the celebration of Easter has existed since the earliest days of the Christian movement. That being said, we as Christians can't ignore the significance of a Christian practice that has survived two millennia of changes and upheaval in our Christian Church. This begs the question, what significance does it hold for us today?

The importance of Lent in the life of the believer is timeless, being as applicable to a disciple today as it was in the first century. Its timeless value lies in its ability to restore the purity of our faith. This restoration of purity is achieved by living these 40 days in complete devotion to God. Historically this has meant that believers seek to engage in practices of self-denial such as fasting. This practice of self-denial is accompanied by an increased focus on prayer, Bible study, and commitment to Christian living. All of this is designed to create a condition of mindfulness, intended to re-center the believer on the truth of our faith. The value of this goal is as spiritually essential today as it was at any other time in human history.

In our modern practice, we need to be mindful of the purpose of Lent. All too often today Christian engagement in self-denial practice is more about self-improvement and less about spiritual re-centering. We must remember that self-denial is only valuable if it draws us closer to God. The best form of Lenten self-denial is removing something that stands between God and us. While this will be different for each person the purpose must be to live a more God-centered life. To pursue a Lent that matters means appropriate self-denial coupled with an increased focus on prayer, consistent dedicated time in the Word, and a renewed commitment to living each day in the manner prescribed by our Lord. So as we enter this Lenten Season let us honor the ancient tradition we have received and seek to gain the intended benefit of a rejuvenation of our faith.

Romans 12:1-2, "I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, on the basis of God's mercy, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable act of worship. Do not be conformed to this age, but be transformed by the renewing of the mind, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect."



United Methodist Corner

In last month's column, I described Wesley's understanding of grace as the undeserved love, mercy and forgiveness of God. Wesley believed that the working of God's grace is expressed in three primary ways. Prevenient grace, which is the grace that goes before us, gives us the impulse to live rightly and to do good. Wesley likened prevenient grace as the porch of a house. The Holy Spirit, even when we are unaware of God presence, is what draws us to the house of God. If we look at another metaphor of our spiritual life being a journey that we embark on, the Holy Spirit gives us the impulse to travel and a road map. But it's not enough that we have the desire to travel, we have to actually embark on the journey.

This is where Wesley's understanding of justifying grace comes into play. Wesley understood justification as God's pardoning and forgiving of our sins. We cannot make things right on our end in our relationship with God because of our brokenness and sin. So, God took the initiative. Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 5:18 "All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and has given us the ministry of reconciliation."

Going back to Wesley's analogy of the house, Christ is the door or doorway leading to salvation in God. The door is welcoming us and inviting us to come through and be changed and transformed by Christ into new creatures. Our going through the door is embarking on a spiritual journey in Christ Jesus. This journey is made possible by what Christ did for us in his sacrifice on the cross.

We need to remember Christ's sacrifice is not just a thing of the past. We are still receiving spiritual benefits of what Christ did. Unless we remember and reflect upon that sacrifice, we are in danger of trying to justify ourselves before God and others. Our ego and pride often deceive us into thinking that we are better than we actually are. Paul warned the Roman house churches not to think of themselves more highly than they ought to think, but according to the grace that God has assigned to them. One of my daily devotional prayers begins, "O loving Christ who died upon the tree. Each day and each night I remember your love." Christ is the doorway to being reconciled and in the full presence of God. Just as we go in and out of the doors of our homes each day, we are served well if we remember Christ's loving sacrifice for us each morning and night. Our remembrance will go a long way to help us, by the grace of God, to live humble lives as the people of God. Next month we will explore Wesley's understanding of sanctifying grace.
